- Simple, quiet and unpretentious with the presence of something of the 'eternal now'.


 Welcoming and inclusive to all people of goodwill, regardless of faith, race, gender, sexuality or any other identity.

Parish Giving Scheme

A better way of giving to our church parish

In order to simplify how financial donations to the parish are made the Church Leadership Team (PCC) have signed up to the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS). PGS is a registered, not for profit, national charity designed to best manage regular gifts for parishes. It provides the simplest and most secure way for everyone to give to our parish and there is no charge to either the donor or the parish for using it. PGS manages all the administration on our behalf, and also claims gift aid where applicable, so it makes a big difference to the amount of work required by the treasurer (me!) and gift aid secretary. The parish then receives all the donations and gift aid straight into the parish bank account on a monthly basis.

Moving forwards I would encourage anyone who would like to make either regular or one-off donations to the parish to do it through PGS.

It's straight forward to do. There are three ways: online, by paper form, or over the phone. Whichever way you use you will need our PGS parish code which is 460646044

You, as the donor, are completely in control through any of these methods and can change your donation at any time. You can choose the frequency and amount of your gift and opt in to gift aid, if you are eligible. Your donation can also remain anonymous if you prefer.

Whilst it is possible to continue making donations the way they are now, I would

strongly recommend changing to using PGS as it enables the parish to make the most of the benefits of the scheme.

Report from the June and July meetings

Meeting place/Pavilion plus table tennis table

Recent visitors to Bardsey playground will have noticed the newly installed Pavilion. The Pavilion is a result of the village survey in 2022, undertaken by BPC and residents requesting a local meeting place. Thanks to ClIr Osborne who has led this project on behalf BPC and also many thanks to the Emmerdale S106 panel for awarding half of the funding towards this project.

The table tennis table which was formally located on the site is in the process of being moved to a new location next to the adult fitness equipment.

Biodiversity

Our biodiversity policy has now been agreed and is on the Bardsey village website

We are currently looking at our contract with LCC on grass cutting around the village, to maintain a managed approach, whilst minimising any negative impact on biodiversity.

Ragwort

Ragwort is a tall erect plant bearing large flat-topped clusters of yellow daisy like flowers from July to October. The seeds from this plant are blown by the wind and it appears that it is spreading along the grass verges, hedgerows and everywhere!

Ragwort is covered by the Weeds Act 1959

and is harmful and dangerous for horses and cattle. It can be easily pulled or dug out of the ground and it is best if it is not allowed to spread.

Village pond

Cllr Bosomworth reported that the pond is covered in water lilies at the moment and there are a few moorhens. The outlet is running at present but will probably need clearing in the autumn.

Flower tubs & village signs

These have been planted up with begonias by Cllr Flockton and Pauline Hills. Thank you to all those who water and look after the tubs throughout the year. Many thanks also to Pam Snowden and Sue Jubb for planting up and looking after the tubs on Tithe Barn Lane and near to the duck pond.

Parish walks

Clir Flockton reported that unfortunately, due to heavy rain, it was decided to cancel the walk on Saturday 15 June, but seven ladies enjoyed our second walk on Saturday 29 June. We incorporated Hetchell Woods on the east side of the village as well as the walk all along the western boundary.

There will be no meeting in August and the following meeting will be held on **Wednesday 18 September** at 7.00pm in Bardsey Village Hall Committee Room.

The first ten minutes will be set aside to deal with any issues raised by residents. Our clerk's e-mail address is:

New A58 Pedestrian Crossing

This is a heartfelt plea to all Bardsey residents to please email our local councillor Matthew Robinson, in support of a new pedestrian crossing to keep our families and community safe when crossing the A58, when walking to school, catching the bus or going for a walk in Hetchell Woods.

A huge thanks to everyone who attended the Bardsey Parish Council meeting last month in support of this crossing for the A58 at the bottom of Mill Lane. It was well supported, with ten plus village members attending, and it was reassuring to hear that we have full support from the Parish Council, who commented positively about the show of support. They confirmed that they are in regular contact with Leeds City Council (LCC) to press this issue forward.

As things stand, LCC appear to be open to the installation of a crossing but haven't yet committed to what type of crossing they would support, and who will fund it. One council member shared that a pelican crossing could cost as much as £60,000, which could be challenging to secure from LCC, who have a c£300m backlog of potholes needing to be fixed, amongst other funding pressures.

The recommended way forward, as advised by the Parish Council, is for members of the community to contact our ward councillor, Matthew Robinson, to show how much local support there is for a crossing. Matthew is in support of a crossing but for him to get a favourable decision from LCC he needs to demonstrate the weight of local public support. The more people we can




show who are in support of this crossing, the more likely it is that he can get funding support from LCC. Matthew's email is matthew.robinson@leeds.gov.uk.

We are now appealing to the wonderful community of Bardsey to reach out to and show support for a crossing, and explain why we are affected by the lack of one, given the difficulty in crossing that stretch of busy road, with vehicles speeding. Even if a crossing won't directly benefit you as a Bardsey resident please consider sending Matthew an email to show your support as it will make a huge difference to so many members of our younger and older community. From previous experience, Matthew is very responsive and supportive of the local community reaching out to him.

There will also be a petition in the church to sign as an alternative to sending an email in case this is preferable for some residents.

Eco Chat: Carbon Offsetting

If we are to successfully address climate change we must at least maintain the concentration of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere at their present level and if possible reduce it to that of the 1970s. That means removing more carbon from the atmosphere than we add to it through emissions!

Reducing carbon emissions can be tough for individuals but even more so for businesses. So when an idea like carbon offsetting comes along it sounds too good to be true - and often it is!

Carbon offsetting refers to ways of 'compensating' for those emissions we can't eliminate ourselves, by investing in actions or projects that either help others to reduce their emissions, or that remove carbon directly from the atmosphere themselves. The idea being that you 'cancel out' the emissions you produce, leaving the amount of carbon dioxide (CO₂) - the main greenhouse gas - unchanged in the atmosphere.

Many companies are now using carbon offsetting in order to claim that they are 'carbon neutral', often without significantly (if at all), reducing their carbon emissions. This is known as 'greenwashing' and many

companies are guilty of it, particularly airlines and oil companies.

Greenwashing is the practice of making brands appear more sustainable than they really are, through false claims and deceptive marketing.

Common types of carbon offsetting schemes include reforestation (tree planting), peatland restoration, renewable energy development and investment in physical carbon capture technologies.

The real problem is that there is no way of knowing how much carbon can be offset by a particular scheme or whether they are even practical in the first place.

Take tree planting for example. One tree can absorb between 10-40kg of CO₂ each year, depending on the species and growing conditions, but it can take up to 20 years for tree saplings to reach maturity and become viable for carbon offsetting. But let's assume for this example that we can plant fast growing trees which immediately absorb on average 25kg of CO₂ per year. To offset just one tonne of carbon emissions per adult in the UK - which is only around 10% of an average carbon footprint - we would need to plant 1.6 billion trees each and every year! That would mean covering the whole of the UK in trees within four vears.

Offsetting is not bad, tree planting in particular, it's just not an alternative to reducing or eliminating carbon emissions. It needs to be a part of the solution, not the complete answer.

Learn how over half the village became part of the Harewood Estate until the 1950s and how the village prospered, as commuters were attracted by the healthy environment and improved transport links. Despite significant house building from the 1970s a large part of the village is subject to conservation status so that the heart of the

village retains many older buildings, which illustrate its history. We will also share stories about some of the notable residents.



SWIFTS: GUARDIANS OF OUR SUMMER SKIES

Every year, the arrival of swifts heralds the beginning of summer in East Keswick. These remarkable birds have been a familiar sight in our village for generations, darting and swooping through the skies with their distinctive crescent-shaped wings and highpitched calls. However, over the past few decades, there has been a noticeable decline in their numbers, prompting a concerted effort to ensure their survival.

Historically, swifts have been a cherished part of East Keswick's natural heritage. Residents recall a time when the skies were filled with these agile fliers, nesting in the eaves of old buildings and bringing life to the summer months.

Swifts are migratory birds, spending their winters in Africa and returning to the same nesting sites in Europe each summer. This incredible journey covers thousands of miles, showcasing their resilience and navigational prowess. Unfortunately, swift populations have declined significantly in recent years and they were added to the red list in the 2021 UK Conservation Status Report. Key reasons for this decline include the loss of traditional nesting sites due to modern building practices, a reduction in insect populations (their primary food source), and climate change affecting their migratory patterns.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

Install nest boxes: Swifts prefer to nest in

cavities in buildings.
Installing swift nest
boxes can provide
much-needed nesting
sites. Place these boxes
at least five metres
above the ground and
ensure there is a clear
flight path.



Protect existing nests: If you have swifts nesting in your building, avoid any renovation work during the breeding season (May to August). It is illegal to disturb or destroy swift nests under UK law, with potential penalties for violations.

Create insect friendly gardens: Planting native flowers and avoiding pesticides can help boost insect populations, providing a food source for swifts.

Support local conservation efforts: Joining or donating to organisations like EKWT can help fund essential conservation work. The Trust relies on volunteers and donations to manage their reserves and run community events.

The RSPB is taking action to help swifts and has information about how to help on their website www.rspb.org.uk

Engaging in conservation efforts fosters a sense of community and stewardship for our natural environment. It's a joy to see the skies fill with swifts, knowing you've played a part in their survival.

By preserving our swifts, we enrich our community and maintain the delicate balance of our local ecosystem. Let's work together to ensure that East Keswick remains a haven for these incredible birds.


