East Keswick **Climate Change**Garden

I am sure you would like to join me in thanking the many volunteers who have given their time, energy, enthusiasm and skills to help completing our winter planting programme. In total, 400 hedgerow saplings, 20 cherry blossoms, 12 orchard fruits trees and 86 native wild honeysuckles were planted. These will provide vital homes and food for wildlife, and a beautiful environment for everyone to enjoy.



On the personal note, I am grateful to Melanie and David Smith from the East Keswick Wildlife Trust for their time and specialist advice. Their support in coordinating and mobilising the volunteers, and lending their tools made a significant impact on the success of the planting party.

Coming Up

In the spring, towards the end of March, grass seeds will be sown on the levelled 750m² area in the garden. This outdoor event space can host over 300 people, providing a venue for education and learning and special events for all neighbouring villagers.



The 8m x 14m wildlife pond will be lined, and rainwater will be redirected to it. More wildlife will find a new home surprisingly quickly, and it is anticipated that within a few days or weeks of the pond being filled with water, skaters, diving beetles and damselflies will be visiting, and amphibians could easily be on scene within the first year. All very exciting times to come.

Winter Visitors

Over the last few weeks, you may have noticed large flocks of thrush sized birds in and around East Keswick. These are Redwings and Fieldfares, both thrush species, which migrate here from Northern Europe to spend the winter before flying back to breed in spring. Birds come here for the mild climate and abundance of food, but when it is snowy and icy, as it has been recently, more birds may be attracted into our gardens in search of food and shelter.





Redwings and Fieldfares are often seen together in flocks, moving around seeking out berries and fallen fruit. The Fieldfare is the larger bird, being slightly bigger than a blackbird. It has a blue-grey head, brown-

grey wings and a speckled breast. It also has a distinctive 'chack-chack' call which can be helpful with identification.

The Redwing is the smallest true thrush seen in the UK. It has a creamy-white stripe above its eye and an orange-red flash on its underwings.

Winter visitors that you may see on your birdfeeder at this time of year are Siskins, Redpolls and Bramblings. Bramblings are similar in size to Chaffinches and may be seen together in mixed flocks. Waxwings are irregular winter visitors depending on the food supply in Scandinavia. When the berry crop fails, there can be a sudden invasion of large numbers of Waxwings called irruptions.

Some of the more commonly seen Robins, Blackbirds and Starlings may also be visitors to the UK boosting the number of residents.

If you would like to find out more about the birds in East Keswick, please join us for our Winter Bird Survey on **Saturday 1 February**. We will be meeting outside St Mary's Church on Moor Lane at 10am. If you have binoculars, please bring them with you and also a drink and packed lunch. Surveys and record keeping are an important part of the work of East Keswick Wildlife Trust to monitor the flora and fauna of our parish. We carry out a bird survey each year in winter and summer.



Bardsey-cum-Rigton **Parish Council Report**

Crossing on Keswick Lane

Bardsey Parish Councillors are delighted to announce that we have finally achieved our objective of obtaining rumble strips and distinct markings which draw attention to the entrance/exit to the footpath though Blacksmith's field, which runs from Bardsey to East Keswick. This comes after many years of receiving requests from concerned residents and parents from Bardsey School and many meetings with our Ward Councillors, highway experts from LCC and ClIr Barbara Hoyland, and other councillors from BPC.

In the past BPC was extremely concerned about safety factors because of the fact that some motorists might not notice the partially concealed entrance/exit onto Keswick Lane. Now, hopefully with all the road markings, etc., the crossing of Keswick Lane will be much safer for children and parents/carers who use this footpath to and from East Keswick on their way to school. Many thanks to East Keswick Parish Council, Leeds City Council and our Ward Councillors for all their help.

A58: Proposed Crossing by Cornmill Ginnel

It was widely accepted that a zebra crossing was most appropriate for this location of the A58 but, due to a zebra crossing requiring lighting and subsequent engineering costs, the overall costs are considerably higher than initially expected and consequently increased funding implications for Bardsey Parish Council, Harewood Ward and LCC Highways.

Ward Cllr Matthew Robinson has written to officers to express the desire to begin consultation on the crossing ahead of funding being confirmed, so that any problems can be identified and the voice of local residents can be captured in order to demonstrate just how much support there is for a crossing. This will seek to confirm to all the stakeholders that this is not just a priority to residents in the immediate vicinity. Also funding discussions are underway with regard to splitting funding and seeking other sources.

The next two meetings will be held on Wednesday 19 February and Wednesday 19 March at 7.00 pm in Bardsey Village Hall Committee Room.

The first ten minutes will be set aside to deal with any issues raised by residents. Our Clerk's e-mail address is:

Eco Chat: Adapting to Climate Change

2024 was the world's hottest year on record, beating 2023 to that dubious accolade. It was also the first year to pass the 1.5°C warming limit.

Whether we like it or not our climate is already changing, it's no longer a scientific prediction. What's important now is how much hotter our planet becomes and what we can do about it. Reducing our carbon emissions must still be a priority, in order

to mitigate the scale of its impact, but we also need to adapt our way of living to accommodate an already warming climate.

Perhaps the biggest threat we face here in the UK is that of flooding, as we have already started to experience. Flooding not only ruins property and possessions, it can also restrict our ability to grow the food we need, disrupt vital transport infrastructure and adversely impact wildlife.

We have to accept that flooding will happen, which means we have to become more resilient to it. Manmade flood defences are expensive and perhaps ultimately futile, and so we must look to more natural means to help control the flow of water into our rivers, increase the ability of the land to absorb water, and of course not build on flood plains!



Those living in low lying coastal areas face the much bigger threat of permanent flooding due to sea level rise, with areas in Lincolnshire, the East Riding of Yorkshire, and the city of Hull, likely to be worst affected in our region.

As some climate change deniers point out, our climate has changed in the past. People and societies throughout history have adjusted to climate variability and extremes, albeit with varying degrees of success, and climate change (drought in particular) has been at least partly responsible for the rise and fall of civilizations.

Earth's climate has been relatively stable for the past 10,000 years, and this stability has allowed for the development of our modern civilization and agriculture. Our modern life is tailored to that stable climate and not the much warmer climate of the next thousand-plus years.

Keeping our heads in the sand will not stop climate change impacting our lives. We need to take action to ensure we can survive what the climate has in store for us.

The good news is that 2024 was a record year for wind power, with wind providing more electricity than ever last year, as the UK moved further away from planetwarming fossil fuels to power the nation.

Able Community Care

Q. Can I find out what personal information is held about me from my Council Social Services Department?

A. Yes, you can request a copy of the information held about you, called a 'Subject Access Request' (SAR). This could include your housing file, social care file and any other information held about you by the council.

Currently, the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) does not specify any time limitation for a data subject requesting their personal data and usually there is no fee to pay.

The time limit for responding to a subject access request (SAR) is usually one month from the day the organisation receives the request.

Q. My Father, now in his late 70's, has different sized feet. We find it difficult to buy footwear for him other than buying two pairs of shoes in different sizes. My local shoe shop has closed so cannot ask them for any information, can you advise where we could look?

A. There are online shoe retailers who can help, one of which is 'Tripalot'. They are an online store providing footwear for those who require odd-sized pairs or just a single shoe, they also sell same sized pairs. Their website is www.tripalot.co.uk

Q. I am finding that climbing my stairs at home is becoming more difficult and I am thinking about getting a stair lift but know nothing about them. How can I get advice about this and possibly other helpful equipment for my home?

A. Stair lifts, other equipment and adaptations are changes you can make to your home to make it safer and easier to move around and do everyday tasks. Your local council offers a service that assesses your home and recommends changes to help, stair lifts are included. It is called 'Home Assessment', it is free and carried out by an Occupational Therapist, usually taking about an hour.

You can call your local council to arrange, or you can apply online by going to: NHS UK – home adaptions – social care and support guidance.

Q. I am getting a little anxious about my home security including access to my back garden and garage. Where should I look for advice rather than getting in a tradesman I know little about other than an advert?

A. The Master Locksmiths Association has members throughout the country.

Members of this association are all criminal record checked, regularly inspected, fully qualified businesses who will employ at least one Master Locksmith.
